



17-MILE DRIVE AND THE 17 POINTS OF INTEREST

Welcome to 17-Mile Drive in Pebble Beach, one of the most famous scenic drives in the world. Follow the red-dashed line in the roadway and wind through the impressive Del Monte Forest.

BRIEF HISTORY

Long before the automobile had become a way of life, horse drawn carriages were the way around one of the most stunning stretches of coastline in the world. 17-Mile Drive started from the famous Hotel Del Monte, now the site of the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey. In 1881, this marked the beginning of visitors to this legendary location. Some historical dates of note:

- 1880** The Pacific Improvement Company opens Hotel Del Monte and buys the Del Monte Forest land
- 1881** The first national golf tournament at Pebble Beach is held – the U.S. Amateur Championship (it returned in 1947, 1961, 1999 and 2018)
- 1882** The Pacific Improvement Company opens Hotel Del Monte and buys the Del Monte Forest land
- 1916** Samuel F.B. Morse contracts Jack Neville and Douglas Grant to design Pebble Beach Golf Links
- 1919** Pebble Beach Golf Links and The Lodge at Pebble Beach open to the public
- 1929** The first national golf tournament at Pebble Beach is held – the U.S. Amateur Championship (it returned in 1947, 1961, 1999 and 2018)
- 1966** Spyglass Hill Golf Course opens
- 1972** The first U.S. Open is held at Pebble Beach (it returned in 1982, 1992, 2000, 2010, and 2019 - it will be contested here again in 2027)
- 1987** The Inn and Links at Spanish Bay opens
- 1999** Casa Palmero and The Spa at Pebble Beach open
- 2017** Fairway One at The Lodge opens
- 2018** The Pebble Beach Visitor Center opens
- 2019** Pebble Beach Centennial Celebration, punctuated by hosting the U.S. Open for a sixth time and 2040 and 2048)
- 2021** The Hay Opens
- 2023** The U.S. Women's Open is contested at Pebble Beach Golf Links for the first time (returning in 2035, 2040 and 2048)

LEARN MORE BY VISITING THE PEBBLE BEACH VISITOR CENTER!

- 1 SHEPHERD'S KNOLL** Shepherd's Knoll offers a unique elevated view looking down on Monterey Bay. It's named after local railroad man Abraham D. Shepard, who also built the upper scenic route on 17-Mile Drive in the forest.
- 2 HUCKLEBERRY HILL** Take in this tree-top-level view at Huckleberry Hill, where you can see Santa Cruz in the distance. The huckleberry-filled hills, which have been set aside as permanent preserved forest, were rumored to be frequented by writers Robert Louis Stevenson and John Steinbeck.
- 3 SPANISH BAY BEACH** Spanish Explorers camped out here in 1769. They were trying to find the Monterey Bay based on a description from 1602, but it took them a year. This beautiful beach was named Spanish Bay Beach after their early visit.
- 4 THE RESTLESS SEA** The Restless Sea earns its name as one of the most turbulent sections of coastline in Pebble Beach. Waves are constantly converging and crashing into each other, likely caused by submerged rocks.
- 5 POINT JOE** Early mariners mistook Point Joe as the entrance to Monterey Bay, making it the site of many shipwrecks. In the early 1900s, a man named Joe lived in a driftwood hut here, selling trinkets to tourists and tending goats. It is debated whether Joe was named for the Point, or the Point was named for Joe.
- 6 CHINA ROCK** China Rock was the site of a small Chinese fishing village in the late 1800s.
- 7 BIRD ROCK** This wildlife hub is buzzing with birds, harbor seals, and barking sea lions. Bird Rock was actually covered in four to five feet of pelican and cormorant guano until 1930, when it was harvested as a fertilizer. Sea lions took advantage of the cleaned-off perch, and have been sunbathing there ever since.
- 8 SEAL ROCK** The tucked-away beach at the mouth of Seal Rock Creek is a great spot to stretch your legs. Picnic, explore tide pools, or hike on the boardwalk toward the colorful Gingerbread House.

NATURAL HABITAT

Pebble Beach Company has always focused on the dedicated stewardship of this harmonic natural ecosystem. Samuel F.B. Morse, founder and initial visionary of Pebble Beach, said that the company's primary purpose was the continued preservation of the unique beauty of the coast and forest, an area often described as "the greatest meeting of land and sea in the world." Please respect our environment by not disturbing the native plants, birds, and animal species. Please also remember, for your personal safety, to be aware of your surroundings and exercise caution around the ocean and rocky areas. - 9 FANSELL BEACH OVERLOOK** Fanshell Beach is one of the primary pupping habitats for harbor seals on the Central Coast.
- 10 CYPRESS POINT LOOKOUT** Cypress Point Lookout offers a spectacular spot to catch sunsets, thanks to its southwest views. The pure white sand of the beach below is home to harbor seals, who each spring return to bear their young. Closed April 1 to June 1 for pupping season.
- 11 CROCKER GROVE** Crocker Grove is home to the largest and oldest Monterey Cypress trees in existence. It is named after Charles Crocker, the railroad baron responsible for building the luxurious Hotel Del Monte in Monterey and the original 17-Mile Drive. Pebble Beach contains one of only two native Monterey Cypress forests in the world. The other is across Carmel Bay at Point Lobos State Park.
- 12 THE LONE CYPRESS** For more than 250 years, the world-famous Lone Cypress has braved the elements atop its rocky pedestal overlooking the Pacific Ocean. Known as Midway Point on the original 17-Mile Drive, this iconic tree has been the logo for Pebble Beach Resorts since its founding in 1919.
- 13 GHOST TREES AT PESCADERO POINT** Ghost Trees at Pescadero Point is a unique stop full of spooky sun-bleached Cypress trees. It is also a legendary Big Wave surf spot, with swells approaching 50 feet in the right winter conditions.
- 14 PEBBLE BEACH VISITOR CENTER** From its early days as a simple stopping point on a scenic carriage ride to its emergence as the golf capital of the world, the fascinating story of Pebble Beach is brought to life at the Pebble Beach Visitor Center. The new Visitor Center is a wonderful stop to learn about Pebble Beach history, pick up souvenirs or grab a refreshment for the drive.
- 15 PEBBLE BEACH GOLF LINKS** No public course in the United States can match the major championship pedigree of Pebble Beach Golf Links. Built by amateur golfers Jack Neville and Douglas Grant in 1919, Pebble Beach hosted its sixth U.S. Open in June 2019 to go along with five U.S. Amateurs, two U.S. Women's Amateurs, the 1977 PGA Championship, and the 2023 U.S. Women's Open. Ranked the No. 1 public course in America, Pebble Beach Golf Links is scheduled to host the 2027 U.S. Open. Learn more about the rich history of Pebble Beach at the Wall of Champions behind the first tee.
- 16 THE HAY** Since 1957, The Hay has been a hub of Pebble Beach Resorts drawing players of all skill levels to the short course that was the vision of longtime Head Professional, Peter Hay. In 2021, Tiger Woods -- who set the record for largest margin of victory at a U.S. Open just down the hill at Pebble Beach Golf Links -- brought a brilliant redesign to the course punctuated by the second hole, an exact replica of famed No. 7 on Pebble Beach Golf Links. Whether you play The Hay once, twice, or not at all, Hay's Place presents an ideal spot to recap your round(s) or simply enjoy the views.
- 17 FORD MEADOW** Robert F. Ford (1907-1979) knew he was "home" when he passed by this meadow. A generous donor to the work of the Del Monte Forest Conservancy, the meadow was dedicated to his memory on August 26, 1981.





VISITOR USE OF STILLWATER COVE BEACH: We hope you enjoy your visit to Stillwater Cove. This area is recognized for its rich and relatively undisturbed marine life. In order to preserve this uniquely sensitive habitat, we ask that you observe the following rules. Hours: The beach at Stillwater Cove (and visitor restrooms) may be used during daylight hours.

PARKING RESERVATIONS: Visitors to Stillwater Cove may use one of two free public access parking areas, each located outside the Beach & Tennis Club parking lot, a short walk from the Cove. Up to six spaces may be reserved for a specific date by calling 831-625-8536 at least 24 hours in advance. Another 10 spaces (plus any of the unreserved six spaces) are available daily on a first-come, first-served basis. Prior to parking in the areas, visitors may enter The Beach & Tennis Club parking lot to drop off or pick up equipment or persons. Parking and access may be prohibited on certain dates because of special events such as golf tournaments. Equipment Drop-off/Pickup: Scuba divers or other visitors who plan to utilize equipment or other bulky materials at the beach may drive to designated drop-off/pickup location in The Beach & Tennis Club parking lot for loading vehicle. Please note The Beach & Tennis Club parking lot will be closed to visitor vehicles between 11:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. daily, during special events, and for maintenance one day a month. Public coastal access parking is not allowed in The Beach & Tennis Club lot and vehicles parked in The Beach & Tennis Club will be towed at the owner's expense. Visitor parking reservations will not be accepted during the restricted periods. Federal and State Regulations: Please remember that beach visitors must adhere to all federal, state, and local laws, and ordinances. Activities that may be unlawful or unsafe are not permitted, including overnight camping, unleashed pets, firearms or weapons, motorized vehicles, launching of boats that cannot be readily accomplished by use of the boat ramp, collecting of marine species protected or regulated by federal or state Fish and Game agencies, or disturbing in public view.

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY: 17-Mile Drive and the other roadways in Del Monte Forest are privately owned; right to pass is by permission and is subject to control of the owner as stated in Section 1008 of the California Civil Code. Admission may be refused to anyone. The license to the roads is subject to the conditions set forth below and may be revoked at any time. Traffic regulations strictly enforced. No plant or animal life of any description should be disturbed, injured, or removed. No drones are allowed. No overnight camping is allowed, but picnicking is permitted in specified areas. Fires do not burn around in private driveways. Because of EXTREME FIRE HAZARD, fires are prohibited. Fishing is subject to CA Fish & Wildlife regulations and is prohibited between Point Joe and Asilomar Beach. Hunting and firearms are prohibited, as is the feeding of wildlife. All persons using the roadways are subject to the Vehicle Code of the State of California and to Del Monte Forest Private Road Use Policy, a copy of which is available for inspection at Pebble Beach Company offices. Del Monte Forest is patrolled by a full-time private security force in conjunction with the Monterey County Sheriff's Office and California Highway Patrol. Motorcycles are prohibited on Del Monte Forest roadways.

WARNING: In coastal areas along 17-Mile Drive the surf is subject to unexpected life-threatening waves and currents; swimming and wading in these areas is unsafe. Climbing and walking on rocks is unsafe and prohibited. Watch for deer and horses crossing roadways.




